# The Sackler and Freer Galleries are Open Once Again

fter a long period for extensive and much needed renovation, two of the United States (and world's) premier collections of Asian arts have reopened.

The two galleries are distinct from each other in many ways, including the buildings themselves and the way the galleries handle their collections. The Freer collection was the gift of Charles Long Freer (1854-1919). The railroad magnate owned over 9,400 paintings, manuscripts, sculptures, craftworks, and tapestries as well as a first-rate collection of works by Impressionists and other contemporary masters including Whistler and Childe Hassam. When he approached the US Government with a proposition and endowment funding for a gallery, he was referred to the Smithsonian's Board. They accepted this generous offer. Freer did make one stipulation though. The collection of Asian work must remain intact; it could not be sold or lent out, acquisitions were all that was allowed. Freer felt strongly that scholars should be able come to the museum to study any part or parts of the intact collection at any time. The Smithsonian agreed to the constraint and gratefully accepted the offer. Construction began in 1921 and the finished museum was officially opened to the public on May 9, 1923. The original gift of 7,500

objects has now grown to more than 23,000. With the exception of an expanded and updated underground storage space in 1933, the beautiful original structure designed by noted architect Charles A. Platt remains intact.

Dr. Arthur Sackler (1913-1987) was a notable Jewish psychiatrist and philanthropist who believed that when one was so fortunate it was imperative to give back to the community and the public. He had amassed a huge and enviable collection of Asian art works. He felt strongly about the public having access to much of the collection after his death, choosing the Smithsonian to be the recipient of a \$4,000,000 gift and 1,000 paintings and sculptures. The legislation was passed by Congress to approve construction in 1979. Ground was broken for the Arthur M. Sackler Gallery in 1983 and the gallery, connected to the Freer via an underground passage, was opened to the public on September 28, 1987.

One of the major things that distinguishes the Sackler from its sister gallery is that 96% of the Sackler is underground! Jean Paul Carlhian, the Sackler's architect, had a big challenge. He had to design not just the Sackler, but the Dillon Ripley Centre and the National Gallery of African Art as well. The resulting product was the interconnected Quadrangle Complex of

these parts of the Smithsonian, all but a tiny portion underground, and with the exquisite and peaceful Enid Haupt Garden on its roof.

The other major difference between the Freer and the Sackler is that Dr. Sackler chose not to put any restricting stipulations on the collection. The directors may acquire and sell objects, and they may lend part of the collection.

Together the Freer-Sackler complex continues its mission to illuminate the world of Asian arts. The Galleries have an extensive intern and fellowship program that attracts students from all over the United States and the world. Educational workshops for professionals, such as the Chinese Object Study Workshops and In the Dig House: Behind the Scenes in Archaeology, and for lay people in every area from Chinese Calligraphy to puppet making for children are presented regularly. As a visitor you will be exposed to the wonders of Chinese sculpture, the luscious tapestries and silk painting of Japan, and the intense and intricate calligraphy of Persia and the Middle East. Your eyes will be opened to a completely different set of artistic and cultural sensibilities. It is my hope that those reading this article will take full advantage of the opportunities the Smithsonian offers in free visits to one of the world's great museum and education organizations.
